New Harmony, Indiana is a special place and our CIR New Harmony "Kunstfest" Weekend is a very special event, and we only do it about every five years.

CIR's New Harmony "Kunstfest" Weekend Auto Tour will be brought back this year on September 20 – 21, 2025 after a four-year hiatus. Kunstfest is New Harmony's annual German arts, crafts, food and music festival and their largest and most popular festival of the year. "Kunst" means art in German.

New Harmony is an Indiana State Museum Historic Site and supported by the Lilly Foundation, Ball Foundation, Baffler Trust and the University of Southern Indiana. New Harmony was the location in 1814 where Harmonists from Harmony, Pennsylvania tried to establish a Utopian Society. They created many permanent structures that have all been restored and preserved. The entire town is kind of a dichotomy. If you have never been here before, we strongly recommend you take the Guided Group Historical Tour at 1 PM to fully understand New Harmony and all it represents.

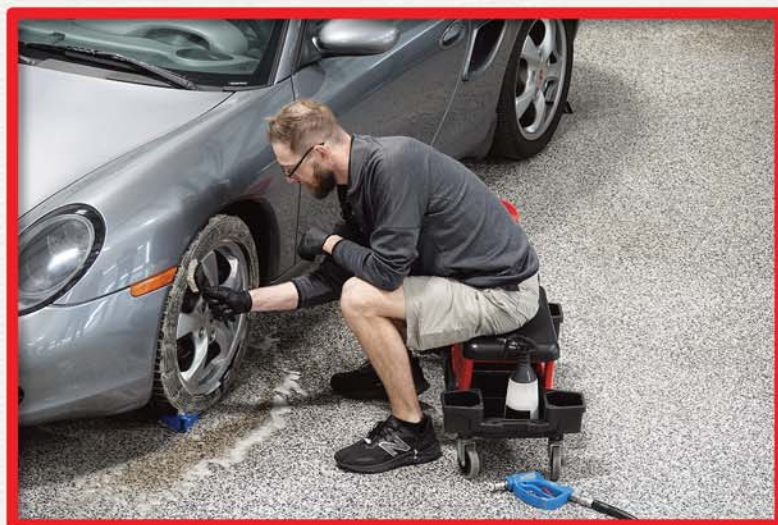

South Central Indiana Porsche Picnic

We are a fortunate group of people in the Central Indiana Region PCA!

The Porsche Picnic in south central Indiana was held under blue skies with white puffy clouds, mild temperatures and a nice breeze on May 17. Some of us indulged in a little Brown County coffee and Boston Cake Company coffee cake, while socializing ahead of the start of the drive. This scene was quite a contrast to just 14 hours earlier when a tornado passed through the area.

The EF-2 tornado ran some 35 miles across Monroe, Brown and Bartholomew counties packing 148 mph winds the night before. The old tour adage of being prepared but remaining flexible was right-on as the last leg of our planned journey was disrupted by massive storm damage in the Grandview Lake area.

Channeling the type of tour notes produced by Bob Snyder, longtime CIR member and club historian, I tried to bring out interesting bits on the geology, architecture and roadside vehicles disintegrating into the ground. We had twelve cars and seventeen participants both the cars and participants enjoyed the trip!

Indiana geography is dominated by two landforms, the Scottsburg lowlands and the Norman uplands. These landforms cut the state diagonally from Louisville suburbs to Martinsville. The landforms were produced by a combination of glacial activity, in the case of the lowlands, and uplift of resistant rock layers to the west. With the uplift, erosion of the softer surrounding rocks left

series of prominent ridges across the southwestern portion of the state.

The country roads explored in Bartholomew, Jackson, Washington and Brown counties exemplify these distinct landforms best. While not the smoothest roads, the narrow county roads with no shoulders, few lane lines, blind crests, and blind turns demand attention of both the

driver and navigator.

This tour was about traversing the intersection of the lowlands and the uplands traveling south to Brownsburg, Jackson-Washington State Forest, Medora, Leesville, Norman, and Christianburg. My favorite part is heading south, just before Brownsburg, where the vast plains of the lowlands to the east, butt up to the uplands visible to the south and west.

A close second was climbing Skyline Drive North in Jackson-Washington SF to the Slygo Vista. Along the way, we saw a half dozen little white, clapboard churches, a '49 Buick 51 Super Sedanette, the 432-foot Medora covered bridge, took a ton of pictures at the Medora Brick factory ruins, met some large, friendly brick factory dogs, saw a high school built in 1857, enjoyed a relaxing picnic at the Salt Creek Winery, drove past a Ford-Ferguson 9N tractor masquerading as lawn art and a MG Midget/Austin Healy Sprite truly becoming part of the ground and supporting plant life!

With the storm-triggered detour we missed Grandview Lake and Tony Stewart's home and hunting preserve, a very small consolation on our parts. We got a first-hand look at the storm devastation with our alternate route having just enough room to negotiate the downed trees.

Certainly, gave us perspective; being thankful for still having a roof over our heads, having great friends, enjoying a beautiful day in our gorgeous automobiles.

Fortunate indeed!

"Right out of high school I started on the crew of one of the first rear-engine dragsters in the country. The Coachmen Auto Club was running a "A/D" gas dragster, that was full dragster, but with essentially a Sportsman class engine running on gasoline," said Perkins. "After Big Daddy Don Garlits' huge crash in 1970, dragster racing changed to rear engines. They were a much safer design." The Indiana based Coachmen Auto Club was building and racing drag cars all over the country.

"I got the job as crew chief running on our first rear-engine car with Rusty Firestone driving. We held the national IHRA record in both top speed and elapsed time for our class." Oddly, it was through the Coachmen Don learned about Porsches. "In '85 or so, a guy brought a green 911 whale-tail turbo with a buckskin plaid interior to the club meet one weekend. It was gorgeous, I got hooked and thought...maybe someday."

After a really successful time in racing, Don moved into the commercial trucking world starting as a shop technician and working his way through various jobs and firms finally into sales with Stoops Freightliner right here in Indianapolis on the southside. As time went on, Don felt it was time for a change in direction. He bought a local gun shop in the Indy area, 'triggering' a love for the shooting sports.

After selling the shop, he was recruited by the B&B Group, in Noblesville, where Don is now the COO. B&B is a thirty-five-year-old company that does snow and ice management along with irrigation and lighting systems for hundreds of residential and commercial clients throughout the Central Indiana Region.

That brings us to 2021. A friend let Don and his wife, Shelly, take his brand-new Porsche for a drive. That little test drive started a quest for Don's dream, a Boxster convertible. That led to his current 2004 speed-yellow Boxster S, a car that is simply dazzling in the sunshine. That bright yellow says put that top down and let go for a ride.

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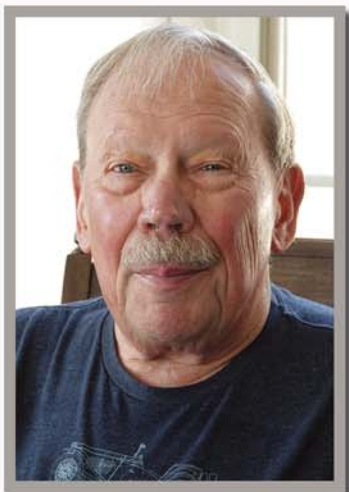

ON Jon Silverberg

*T*he CIR has its own “Top Gun” guy in the form of one of the most unassuming Region members ever. Jon Silverberg is a true car guy to his soul, but with a touch of an adventure few of us will ever match.

Life in the ‘60s and ‘70s was dominated by Vietnam. As a young high school student Jon was fascinated by the Navy, he even got an appointment to the Naval Academy, but chose to attend the University of Minnesota as a Naval ROTC student, majoring in chemical engineering. About this time while an undergrad at Minnesota, Jon bought a brand new, red MGB-GT, it was the start of a long line of true sports cars in Silverberg’s life.

But Jon said, “I wanted to fly. I received my commission through the ROTC program at Minnesota. After graduation in January of 1968, I was sent to flight training at Pensacola, Florida.” That was the start of both an adventure in the air and an adventure on the road continuing with a long series of mostly British sports cars and really fast jet airplanes.

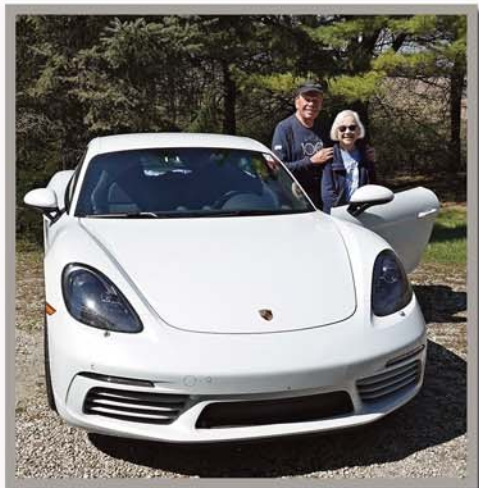
After graduating at the top of his flight class, getting his Wings of Gold, he had the pick of any assignment, literally, any type of aircraft in the Navy inventory. “Of course I was thinking fighters, F-14 Tomcats,” said Jon, “But a buddy suggested the new LTV A-7 Corsair II. So that’s what I picked. After training I was sent to Naval Air Station Lemoore in California with the VA-122 Replacement Air Group to get my carrier qualifications and await my assignment to a carrier. It was clear I was heading to Vietnam.”



Back on the ground, a long line of British cars became part of Jon’s life. Everything from Austin-Healey 3000’s to E-Type Jaguars along with a bunch of MGs; As, Bs, GTs, even a Lotus. Sports cars became as much of his life as the sky and sea had been.

As an attack aircraft pilot he was sent to the aircraft carrier USS Constellation to join VA-147, the ‘Argonauts’, off the coast of Vietnam for a total of three deployments aboard the “Connie”.

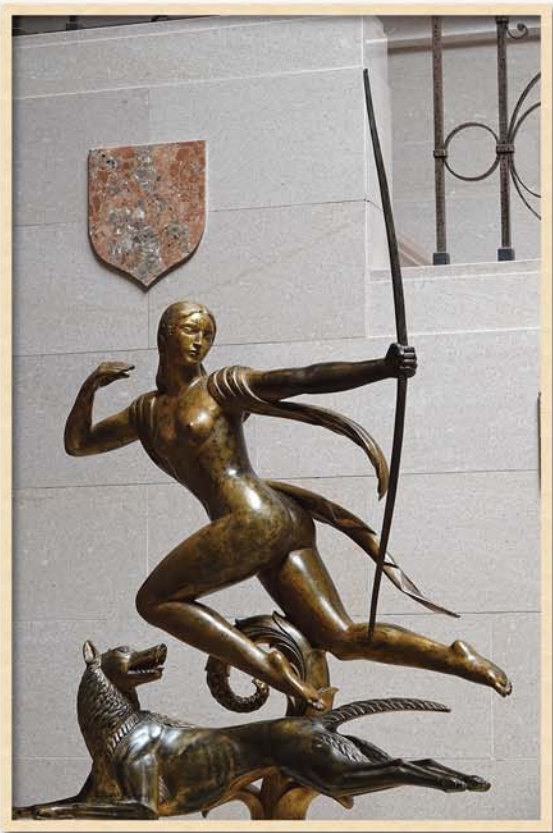

PORSCHE N-MARKED TIRES

Porsche strives for a high level of performance and safety for its road going vehicles and N-marked tires are one example of how this is achieved. Before we get into that, let's take a quick look at some automotive tire basics.

Tires are divided into four high-level categories based on primary driving conditions — summer, all-season, winter and sport. Summer tires provide the highest level of performance in warm weather, with all-season intended for year-round use by providing a good balance between warm and winter weather, typically, with the longest tread life. Winter tires are specifically designed to be most effective in cold conditions and snow, while sport tires are optimized for use on racing circuits such as high-performance driver education events.

While tire type is a somewhat personal preference based on climate and the conditions you intend to drive in, it's important to purchase the correct size for your vehicle. Most vehicles have a tire information sticker in the driver's side door jamb, or you can check your owner's manual. An example size would be 265/35R19, where 265 represents tire width in millimeters, 35 is the aspect ratio which is the ratio of height to width in percent, R indicates radial construction, and 19 is the rim diameter in inches. It's interesting to note the mix of metric and imperial units in the standardized size

designations. Tires are the connection between your car and the road, so they are naturally an important aspect of handling and safety. This is true for both spirited driving and those instances where evasive action is necessary to avoid a collision.

Porsche's dedication to driving performance includes tires that are developed specifically for their vehicles. Made by some of the leading manufacturers including Bridgestone, Continental, Michelin and Pirelli — they carry an N-marking, sometimes called N-specification, to indicate they are tested and approved by Porsche for dynamic and safe driving. Testing criteria includes handling, driving comfort, braking performance, service life, rolling resistance, and high-speed performance — and tires from all four categories are covered — summer, all-season, winter and sport.

Until recently, N-marked tires carried a general approval for Porsche vehicles — meaning they weren't specific to individual models. The first generation of a tire would carry the mark N0, with subsequent iterations using N1,

N2 and so on. Now, Porsche approves tires that are specifically tailored to each individual model using an updated 3-digit marking that includes a model designator. Tires for the 911 Carrera have an NA prefix with the first-generation carrying a mark of NA0, and subsequent iterations marked NA1, NA2, etc. NB is used for Cayman/Boxster, NC for Cayenne, ND for Panamera, NE for Macan and NF for the Taycan.

Be aware that tire manufacturers may build tires with the same name, size and speed rating as a N-marked tire, but for non-Porsche applications. Please note that these tires likely don't share the same construction, materials or rubber compound as the N-marked version. While an N-marked tire will cost more than its standard counterpart, it's the only way to ensure the level of performance and

safety margins that Porsche engineers intended for your vehicle.

Also note that tires carry a four digit date code in the form WWYY where WW indicates the week and YY represents the year of manufacture — so 3219 would indicate the 32nd week of 2019.

Most sources recommend that tires should be inspected, if not replaced, at about six years regardless of tread wear. Those who don't put many miles on their car need to be especially aware as tires can easily reach their age limit with plenty of tread depth remaining.

Always consult with a Porsche dealer if you have questions about the age or condition of your tires, or need help choosing appropriate N-marked tires for your model.

Book Review

Writing is so very hard. Anyone writing a book has my absolute admiration. Writing a book is a massive undertaking, a very hard thing to do. Ray Hartjen's *The Indy 500, A Year-Long Quest to Win the Greatest Spectacle in Racing*, set an interesting challenge for himself. In his own words on the back cover; "The inside story of how teams and drivers prepare for the biggest race of the year." It reads like a diary of the year leading up to the 2024 Indianapolis 500 Mile Race, but Hartjen tells us very little.

Hartjen says it is an insider's view of what goes on in preparation for the biggest most important race in the world. While the writing style is easy to read and brings back memories of the (forgettable) 2023 & 2024 seasons, it leaves this reader wanting more. Like a really good appetizer of perfectly prepared calamari setting your taste buds for a great dinner, then getting a main course of overdone dried out calf's liver.

When I read a book, I want to learn things, I did not know before. I did not learn things in this book. I kept looking for "insider" interviews and antidotes with the participants to learn new things I did not know before. As an avid racing fan, and particularly an Indy 500 fan, there is virtually nothing in this book that was new. It frankly reads more like a compendium of press releases put out by the racing teams, INDYCAR, and the Speedway with essentially no new reporting.

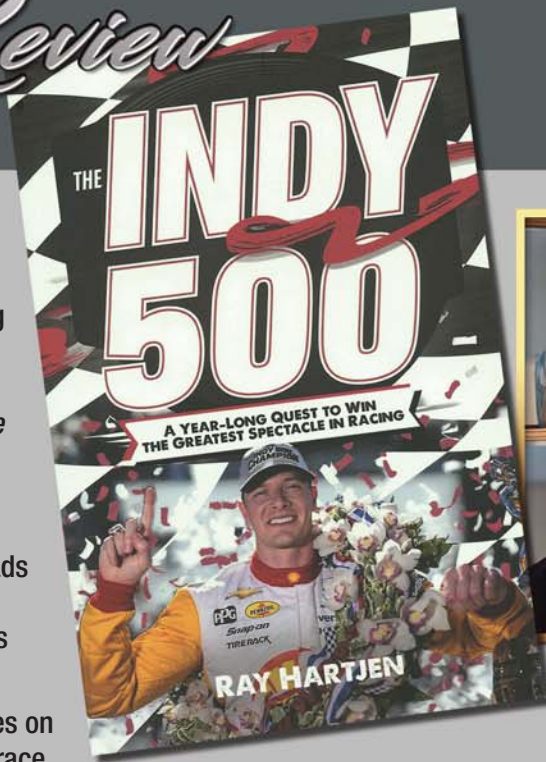
I was not sure who the target audience is for this book. If this book is targeted to the casual fan there is a glaring need for more explanations of terms, perhaps with some photos and illustrations. When the author talks about the limited number of things a team can change on a car, per the rules, you need to illustrate that. Using terms like dampers and sway bars means nothing to someone that does not know what dampers or sway bars are.

If the book is targeted at the hard-core fans, it misses the target by a mile. Like the huge story of the time, maybe the decade, as the Penske empire is jolted to its core with several conflict-of-interest allegations. Hartjen spends little time discussing the biggest issue in all of INDYCAR and none of it from an "insider's" viewpoint. May as well be a Team Penske press release. The book is jammed with statistics but without context.

The author spends a lot of time talking about the driver "silly season," that time of year when deals are done and many drivers change teams be it for a better position, more money, or any driving job at all. It would be nice to hear from a couple of drivers as to how they do this, what are they looking for from a team. Or a chat with team principals as to what are they looking for in a driver. In other words, some "insider" information.

On the flip side it is a little too "inside," in the weeds, for the non-fan. It lacks the romance, intrigue, and magic, we all have for the 500. I am sure Hartjen has a passion for the Speedway, but I was simply not impressed by the lack of storytelling, the lack of information in this book.

The Indy 500, A Year-Long Quest to Win the Greatest Spectacle in Racing, is published by Morgan James Publishing, and is available at Amazon and wherever books are sold.

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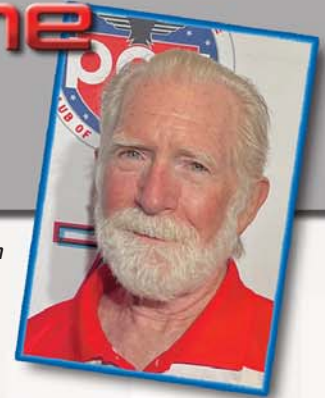
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AROUND THE ZONE

Try it. You'll like it!

PCA offers a broad array of ways to enjoy fellow members and their cars. One of the most beneficial opportunities is offered to the teenagers of PCA and their colleagues through our affiliation with Tire Rack Street Survival. The statistics are impressive; some 80% of Street Survival participants are involved in NO driving incidents before their 25th birthday. However, most of us did not have Street Survival available to us. I dare say that many of us could use a heads-up on our driving skills.

Thankfully, we call it High Performance Driver Education (HPDE) and I personally believe everyone who owns a Porsche should participate in HPDE. I understand that you do not want to risk damage to the jewel in the garage and I can try to convince you that there is very little risk in our HPDE program, which is true. Why am I so convinced HPDE is a good thing?

1. You have an opportunity to experience the behavior of your car under conditions that would get you arrested on public streets. Those conditions inform you of the "operating envelope" of your car: braking, acceleration, turning. On city streets, rural roads, or interstates, there will come a time when you must avoid or crash. Knowing that your car handles well enough to avoid and developing some of the instinct to avoid comes from HPDE.
2. Seeing what's coming is important. Looking ahead as far as you possibly can and looking

behind using all your mirrors regularly, keeping track of the other vehicles on the road are critical to keeping a safe distance between you and those other vehicles. Situational awareness, separation, and planning help avoid incidents. We teach those skills in HPDE.

3. As a driver, being predictable for the other drivers on the road helps avoid the awkward moments when coming together can happen. Developing a pattern of assessment, decision, and execution is fundamental to what we do on the HPDE track.
4. As an extension of point 1 above, driving on a wet track provides a safer opportunity to develop your car-handling skills in those inclement conditions that we experience regularly. You learn the feel of the car as its grip on the pavement is lessened and you learn how to respond to keep the car under control.
5. I could go on, of course, but my personal addiction for HPDE is learning more about myself as a driver and about my car.
